

ADVISEMENT OF LEGAL RIGHTS

You have the following rights:

- To be presumed innocent. 1.
- 2. To understand the nature of the charge(s) filed against you.
- To be represented by an attorney at all stages of your case. If you a charged with an offense that carries a 3. possible jail penalty, you may apply for the services of a public defender, and if you qualify, an attorney would be appointed to represent you for free.
- 4. To remain silent. Any statement you make can be used against you.
- 5. To reasonable bail.
- 6. To have your arraignment continued for good cause.
- To plead guilty or not guilty. Any plea you enter must be knowingly, voluntarily, and intelligently made, and 7. not the result of any undue influence or coercion.
- To a public and speedy trial within 91 days of your not guilty plea, and to have the Town prove the charge(s) 8. against you beyond a reasonable doubt.
- 9. To have a jury trial of three to six jurors if such trial is applicable under the law. Traffic infractions are only eligible for a trial to a judge. Traffic offenses and criminal code violations are eligible for trial to a judge or a jury. If your case is eligible for a jury trial, you must preserve your right to a jury trial by making a written demand and paying a \$25.00 jury fee within 21 days of your not guilty plea. You may make application to have the fee waived if you are indigent. Failure to preserve your right to a jury trial results in a waiver of the right, and your trial would be before a judge.
- 10. To confront any witness called against you at trial.
- To have subpoenas issued by the court to compel the attendance of witnesses at trial on your behalf. Issuance 11. of the subpoenas is free of charge. The court cannot serve the subpoenas, that must be done by a person over the age of 18 who is not a party to the case. You will be required to pay any costs associated with service of the subpoenas.
- 12. To testify or not to testify at trial on your own behalf. If you choose not to testify, that could never be used as evidence of your guilt.
- To make any statement on your own behalf if you plead guilty or are found guilty of the charge(s). 13.
- 14. To appeal to the First Judicial District court any judgement within thirty-five (35) days after a finding of guilt. If you plead guilty, you waive your right to appeal.
- 15. To consult an attorney regarding a conviction of a municipal criminal ordinance that may have additional immigration consequences if you are not a citizen of the United States.
- If you plead guilty or are found guilty, the maximum possible penalties are as follwos: 16. Traffic Infractions: fine of not more than \$999.00; Traffic Offenses: fine of not more than \$999.00 and/or up to 180 days in jail; Municipal Code Violations: fine of not more than \$999.00 and/or up to 364 days in jail; Juvenile Traffic and Criminal violation: fine of not more than \$999.00. In addition, the Court may impose certain court costs.
- 17. Adults--Pursuant to C.R.S. § 24-72-708, under certain circumstances, you may have a right to seal your case. **Juveniles**--Pursuant to C.R.S. § 19-1-306 and 13-10-115.5, if you were a juvenile at the time of the offense and under certain circumstances, you may have the right to expunge your case after full completion of your sentence, closure or dismissal of your case. This does not apply to traffic charges.
- If you are currently serving or are a veteran of the United States Armed Forces, you may be entitled to 1Ω ces
